Inspired by Christian faith, and embracing the core values of **love**, **kindness**, **respect**, **perseverance**, **courage**, **thankfulness**, **truth**, **forgiveness and service**, we encourage all pupils to realise their full potential and grow in confidence, learning to value themselves and others in preparation for their future.

At Maids Moreton Church of England School we believe that these British values are intrinsically linked to our Core Christian school values.

We take our responsibility to prepare children for life in modern Britain very seriously. We aim to nurture our children on their journey through life so they grow into safe, caring, democratic, responsible and tolerant citizens who make a positive difference to British society and the wider world.

We understand that the society in which we live is diverse and therefore, our curriculum and life within school positively promotes and reflects this. We believe strongly in developing a global dimension and enhancing the life experiences of our pupils. We value the different backgrounds of all pupils and families and recognise the government's recommendations to ensure that children have a wide experience beyond their local community. A range of visits, visitors, events, and focus weeks are planned to ensure children's experiences are broad, varied and meaningful. For our pupils, we aim to continually weave the thread of social, cultural, moral and spiritual values through day to day school life as well as the Curriculum, encouraging the development of the whole child. We recognise that such development is most successful when those values and attitudes are promoted by all staff who provide a model of behaviour for our pupils, underpinned by the school's Christian values. Each of the British Values is linked to a key Christian text.

The children at Maids Moreton experience democracy in a variety of ways and see this as being an essential component of successful team work. Children are involved in the democratic processes of voting for school council members, House captains and for the May King and Queen each year. Representatives are elected, mirroring the electoral process. Through this process, they learn to recognise that a majority decision may be different from their own, that procedures have been fair and that outcomes must be accepted. The school council meets regularly to discuss any issues and is genuinely able to impact change within our school. This includes making decisions about fundraising events and how to use the profits to benefit local and global charities as well as the school itself.

All children have the opportunity to complete the annual pupil questionnaire where they are able to put forward their views about the school. Pupils are also regularly asked for their views on Collective Worship through half termly pupi evaluations. As a result, they know that their voice has been heard and that their views will be taken seriously and acted upon where appropriate. Children are also involved in key decision making about aspects of school life, including making choices for purchasing new classroom equipment, organising charity fundraising, supporting eco projects, or deciding how to spend the money raised at school council or PTA events. Children's opinions are listened to; for example in class discussions, which are then brought to full school council meetings and pupils are empowered to advocate for change. Their views are also sought in pupil voice discussions which subject leaders hold as part of their monitoring of the curriculum. Democracy is promoted through the curriculum, for example, in class debates and in PSHCE lessons.

We have very high standards of behaviour across the school (OFSTED 2023 and SIAMS 2017) and promote good behaviour by recognising individual examples as well as groups though our positive behaviour reward systems. Our behaviour expectations are based on our Christian values. The importance of laws, whether they be those that govern the class, the school, or the country, are consistently reinforced. Pupils understand why rules and laws exist. We have a school code of conduct written in age appropriate language and displayed throughout the school as a point of reference. This provides a framework to support pupils' attitudes and behaviour. The rules are clear, fair and regularly promoted. The children are aware of the consequences of not following the rules within the school community and learn to understand the difference between right and wrong.

Inside the school	 "Doing the right thing" is reinforced through assemblies which are delivered with a moral focus, based on Christian teachings and through PSHCE, as well as opportunistically as situations occur. The children are able to articulate how and why we need to behave in school. Pupils and parents in our school expect and receive a fair system based on clearly structured behaviour policy which all stakeholders understand ar follow. This is adhered to by all staff in a fair manner, and children know what to expect. Our behaviour is reviewed at least annually and is published on the schowebsite. We address any behaviour incidents promptly taking time to explain why the behaviour is unacceptable and giving children the opportunity to learn from and modify their behaviour to make better choices going forwards. Wherever possible, there is an opportunity for children to put right what has been done wrong. The Anti-Bullying Policy sets out a zero tolerance for any form of aggression, abuse or violence which extend to pupils, staff, parents and carers. Parents/carers and pupils know that unacceptable behaviour and bullying will not be tolerated and that there are strategies in place to address any concerns that may arise. Visits from authorities such as the Police, Fire and Ambulance Service help to reinforce this message enabling children to recognise authority figures within the wider community. The pupils have the opportunity to work with the local PCSO and the local council to express their views on issues such as road safety.

Through RE lessons, children appreciate the idea that different religions have guiding principles and discuss how these might be different from some criminal and civil laws.
Pupils are taught the value and reasons behind rules and laws; that they exist to govern and protect us, the responsibilities that this involves and the consequences when laws are broken.



All pupils are immersed in a safety week during their time in school and all Year 3 and 4 pupils visit "The Safety Centre" in Milton Keynes to experience real life simulations. This is enhanced through the curriculum including e safety lessons, NSPCC assembly presentations and footsteps and cycle training, as well as visits from the emergency services. Children are taught how to keep themselves safe, including online. Recent surveys show that all pupils and all parents [100%] feel children are safe in school and understand how to stay safe online. We aim to develop lively enquiring minds, the ability to question and reason, the confidence to make mistakes and to develop independence in learning and thought. Independent learning is fostered and respected. The children are consulted on many aspects of school life and are empowered by their part in decision making. As part of our PSHCE curriculum we place a huge emphasis on the social and emotional learning of our children and feel we prepare them for the next stage of their education so they enter this phase as well rounded individuals. Through our aims and Christian values, we ensure that every child is valued as an individual and their unique qualities recognised and celebrated. We celebrate achievements both in and out of school in assemblies, through weekly Golden Awards presented to children which are closely linked to our Christian values. Individual pupils hold key roles and responsibilities in school, such as playground leaders, House captains, school council members and register monitors. These roles are distributed fairly and evenly and rotated to give all children the opportunity to assume responsibility and foster a sense of pride and self - worth. As a result, children are able to assume responsibility and work cooperatively with due regard to the views of others.

Respect is a fundamental school value, around which pivots much of the work of the school. We pay explicit attention to this as part of our RE, PSHCE, and SMSC curriculum as well as through Collective Worship. Children can articulate that respect is a school Christian value and why respect is important; how they show respect for others and how they feel about it for themselves. Children's behaviour demonstrates their good understanding of this value in action. All members of the school community are encouraged to treat each other with respect. We actively promote diversity through our celebrations of different faiths and cultures, and respond to the government's recommendations to ensure that children have a wide experience beyond their local community.

We celebrate the role of Britain both historically and in the present. We want pupils to have knowledge of and be proud of their British heritage and the cultural and historical traditions for which we are renowned the world over. This includes celebrating Royal events, Remembrance Day, the festivals of the Christian calendar [Harvest, Christmas, Easter], alongside those from other cultures such as Chinese New Year, Diwali and Hanukkah. As a church school, we have very close links with the local church and visit often for worship as well as to support learning in other areas of the Curriculum. The children visit places of cultural significance within the locality such as the Old Gaol in Buckingham and learn about significant British figures from the past, such as Florence Nightingale, Walter Tull and Edward Jenner, as well as significant global figures such as Mary Seacole and Nelson Mandela.
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
